Assessments



GCSE languages have a Foundation Tier (grades 1 – 5) and a Higher Tier (grades 4 – 9).

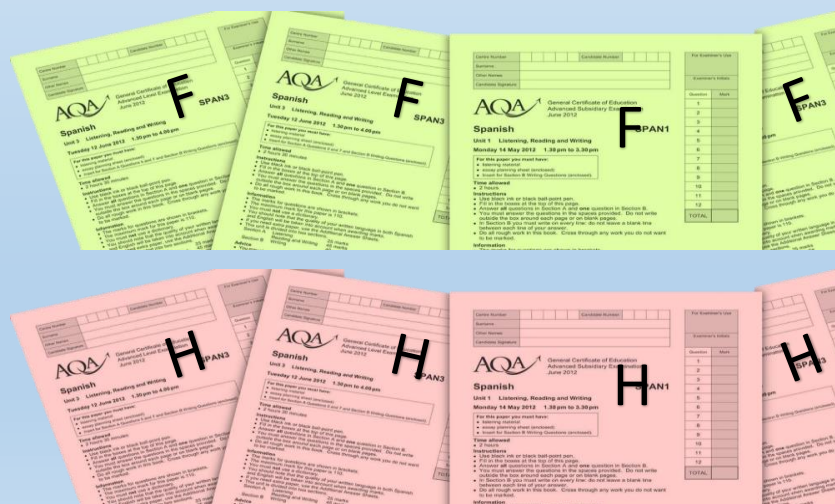
Students must enter for all four skills at the same tier. All question papers must be taken in the same series. Grammar and vocabulary requirements are specific to the individual language.

Listening — 25% final exam

Reading — 25% final exam

Speaking — 25% final exam

Writing — 25% final exam

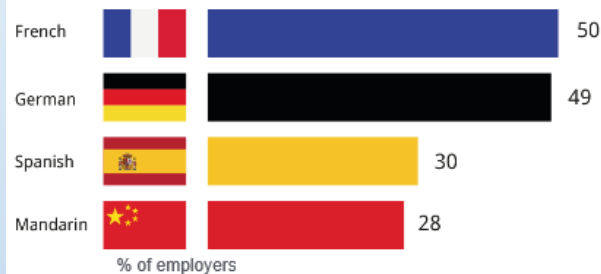


Why learn languages?

Why learn a language?



Spanish



- **Native Speakers:** 470 Million (2017)
- **Non-native Speakers:** 100 Million (2017)
- **Official Language in:** Mexico, Colombia, Spain, Argentina, Peru, Venezuela, Chile, Ecuador, Guatemala, Cuba, Bolivia, Dominican Republic, Honduras, Paraguay, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Puerto Rico, Panama, Uruguay and Equatorial Guinea.
- **Un-officially Spoken in:** Andorra, Belize, Gibraltar and United States.

Spanish: The Most Widespread Language

Spanish is one of the most widespread languages with over 470 million native speakers, only second to Mandarin Chinese. According to the British Council, 34% of UK businesses said that Spanish was “useful to their organization.”

Why Spanish? Being able to communicate in Spanish is also highly transferable in learning other languages. It also opens up more opportunities for travel and immersion, from Central and South America to Europe.

French

- **Non-native Speakers:** 153 Million (2017)
- **Official Language in:** France, Canada, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Madagascar, Cameroon, Ivory Coast, Niger, Burkina Faso, Mali, Senegal, Chad, Guinea, Rwanda, Belgium, Burundi, Benin, Haiti, Switzerland, Togo, Central African Republic, Republic of the Congo, Gabon, Djibouti, Equatorial Guinea, Comoros, Luxembourg, Vanuatu, Seychelles and Monaco.
- **Un-officially Spoken in:** Algeria, Albania, Andorra, Bulgaria, Cambodia, Cape Verde, Dominica, Egypt, Greece, Laos, Lebanon, Morocco, Macedonia, Mauritania, Mauritius, Moldova, Romania, Saint-Lucia, Tunisia and Vietnam.

French: The International Language of Reference

French is currently the second most widely learned language in the world and is one of the working languages of the United Nations as it is spoken on five continents. French is the official language of the International Olympic Committee (IOC), the Court of Justice of the European Union, and is widely used in global communication channels.

Why French? France has the fifth largest economy in the world, thus a key economic partner. French is also a major language of high tech and business as well as in retailing, automotive, luxury goods and aeronautics.
